The Immunization Agenda 2030 (A2030) introduced by WHO aims at achieving a global vision and strategy for vaccines and immunization for the decade 2021-2030, It draws attention towards infectious diseases and their cure and protection. IA2030 states immunization to be a key contributor to people's fundamental right to enjoy physical and mental health and also create a healthier, safer, more prosperous world for all.

Though Brazil being an LEDC, has greatly emphasized on this agenda. In the past few years Brazil has faced a highly miserable and infectious disease called Yellow Fever. Brazil managed to control the outbreak, recording only nine cases and three deaths between 2020 and 2021. Since 2020, the country expanded the yellow fever vaccination area to the entire country and adopted a single-dose schedule starting at 9 months of age to protect younger generations for life. Brazil successfully overcame yellow fever but soon in 2020 the whole world including Brazil experienced a life-threatening nightmare called COVID 19. During this period Brazil faced a mass Destruction to its human resources. Brazil procured 1,022,400 doses of COVID-19 vaccine through the COVAX Mechanism. After a time period of around four weeks Brazil was able to decrease the rate of increase in Covid 19 patients. The number of deaths and hospitalizations also decreased. Brazil has an established pool of scientists and doctors who are prepared to do vaccine

research and development. Our healthcare system for HIV infected individuals is best versed. Although an LEDC, Brazil is giving its best to protect its country from various diseases and securing their future goal to be fully immunized.
